Pastor's Postings How to Be a Church for 200 Years

It is humbling to think that we are the ones here to celebrate the 200th Anniversary of Copper Hill United Methodist Church. I'm thinking of all those who have faithfully served, have given of themselves, struggled to overcome obstacles, and persevered through hard times so that we could see this joyous day. We are indebted to their faith in God's purpose for this church.

We are also humbled to think about what God has wrought. In this era where religious persecution is rampant all over the world, we live in a place where we are still free to worship without fear. In our own New England where so many churches are closing and being abandoned, ours has continued to function, though it has suffered the ups and downs that churches often endure. Surely we are indebted to the grace and faithfulness of God for preserving our church. We can sing with joy, "Great is Thy Faithfulness."

The question arises, "How does a church survive for 200 years?" For that to happen, pastors and parishioners had to work together to keep the main thing the main thing. Whenever the church is distracted by various causes, theological controversies, movements, or fads, they are in danger of ending up in a backwater as the main current bypasses the stagnating pool. But where is the main current? And how do we stay with it? In the words of John 3:16, "God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son. that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life." That's the center. As the United Methodist Discipline states, "The mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ...Christian ministry is the expression of the mind and mission of Christ by a community of Christians" (The Book of Discipline 2004, paras. 120, 125). Our focus and our model is Jesus. So must it always be. When His life is flowing through us, we are truly alive.

Each act of worship and devotion today continues the 200-year journey of "fixing our eyes on Jesus" (Hebrews 12:2). As we keep doing this, the future of the church will be bright.



200 Years Ago by Carol Griffin

In the 1800s, the settlement area known as Copper Hill had its own schoolhouse, railroad line, store, church, and post office (Copper Hill, Ct.). Perhaps because of its location, in the winter it was difficult for the people to get to the "other side of the mountain" in Suffield or East Granby and a bit far to travel to Granby. So the folks of Copper Hill became quite self-sufficient and content in their little corner of the world.

In 1816 six people—Seth Griffin, Aristarchus Griffin, and Calvin Gillet, with their wives—decided it was time to organize a church for the people of the area. Thus was the beginning of the Copper Hill Methodist Church. Members took turns holding services in private homes. They became part of the Granville, Massachusetts circuit, sharing a minister with other churches in Connecticut and Massachusetts. But by 1839, the congregation of the Copper Hill Church had grown to such size as to warrant the formation of their own church building.

In the spring of 1839, a meeting was called in the home of Festus Viets in Copper Hill, and a committee was appointed. A site was selected, land was purchased, and the structure was built. By the fall of 1839, the meeting house was dedicated, built at a cost of \$1400. The location of the church was about two rods north of its present site. It became the center of religious services and social activities including suppers, meetings, church school, bazaars, and quilting bees, as it continues to be today.

This year, 2016, is the 200th birthday of the little church. Standing at the corner of Griffin Road and Copper Hill Road, diagonally across from the Copper Hill Country Club, this plain, white-clapboard structure has been viewed by many as a historic building, which it is. However, it is also a very active, thriving church with a Sunday school, women's group, and a missions committee, serving parishioners from East Granby, Suffield, Granby, and other surrounding towns. Those who have attended Christmas bazaars, bake sales, and delicious home-made suppers here always come back for more. Sunday services at 9:30 AM are a welcoming and friendly experience.

During our celebration of the church's anniversary, a variety of programs, (musical, historical, and social) will be held and open to the public. Notices of these events will be

appearing in newspapers, welcoming everyone to join in to learn more about the Copper Hill community.

Supporting Heifer International

Heifer International was founded by a farmer named Dan West. Dan was a part of a Church of the Brethren congregation and visited the front lines of the Spanish Civil War as an aid worker. When he saw the poverty that existed and the meager supplies of milk, the idea struck him that what was needed was not just to send food, but to give families a cow. That was the beginning of a charity that has continued for more than 70 years.


Today, Heifer International works to empower families to turn hunger and poverty into hope and prosperity. Their goal is not just to give them a handout, but to create sustainable agriculture. The genius of their model is the idea of passing on the gift. This means that families share the training they receive and pass on the first female offspring of their livestock to another family. This extends the impact of the original gift, allowing a once impoverished family to become donors and full participants in improving their own communities.
