Christmas Carols: Story in Song

One of the things I associate most with this season is Christmas carols. When I was growing up, Christmas carols were commonly heard in the store, on the radio, and at church.

Now, traditional Christmas carols like "Angels We Have Heard on High" or "O Little Town of Bethlehem" are becoming less well known.

Who can forget the excitement and power of "Joy to the World," or the quiet peace of singing "Silent Night" with candle in hand at the close of the Christmas Eve service!

The exhilarating "O Come, All Ye Faithful" is a call to worship that anticipates the joyous celebrations to which we look forward.

Carols are such valuable storytellers! As a group, their purpose is to retell and un-



wrap the original Christmas story. They were written to help people remember and celebrate different parts of the Bible's record of the

birth of Jesus.

Take "The First Noel" as an example. It tells the story of the angel's visit to the shepherds, of the unusual star that appeared, and of the visit of the three Wise Men. A few carols also teach basic theology. For example, verse two of the Charles Wesley carol, "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," could serve as a lesson on the divine and human natures of Christ in theology class.

This year during the Advent Christmas season, I have chosen to feature one of the carols of Christmas in each of the messages that I bring. We will sing the carol during the service, along with others, and then reflect together about the meaning and message of the carol. I believe this will enrich our understanding of Jesus' coming as well as helping to pass Christmas carols on to another generation.

is most truly Christmas when we celebrate it by giving the <u>light of love</u> to those who need it most.


Gift Cards

Vision 2020 Plan Approved

At our annual charge conference on October 28, members officially approved the Vision 2020 Plan. The congregation has been putting it together for about two years, first in a long-range planning committee, then in the council, and finally through congregational discussions. The planning involved both ministries and facilities while keeping financial considerations in mind. The plan is divided into three sections, each with a key word.

- 1. **Enhance**: The first part of the plan has involved making improvements to our ministries and existing facilities. Children's ministry and prayer events have been amplified. By direct mail and new events, we have made our church more visible in our community. With new storm windows and more insulation overhead, we can heat our sanctuary more economically and feel warmer. We will also be able to use our sanctuary through the winter for the first time.
- 2. **Develop:** The next section plans for increases in capabilities over the next few years. It proposes adding two rooms which would provide improved children's space on Sundays, as well as an adult meeting room during the week. The plan also sets a goal to increase small groups and to send a short-term missions team to assist in ongoing Sandy recovery efforts in CT.
- **3. Transform:** The last part contains longer-range planning. It seeks to envision the growth of the church past the seating capacity of the current sanctuary.

Dedication of New Worship Technology

Thanksgiving worship was especially exciting on Sunday, November 22 as Copper Hill UM Church dedicated to God three new advances in technology for use in the worship services: a video projection system, a new sound system, and a new keyboard.

The three projects began separately, but dovetailed together during recent months. Bob Stewart launched the video projection system into reality by giving the projector—the single most expensive part—in memory of his late wife, Sallie Stewart, a long-time member of the church. The previous sound system had been aging and was inadequate to handle the requirements of choir and instruments. Bringing the new sound system in now rather than later would also allow for integra-

tion of sound and visual capabilities. With a new sound system coming, it was now possible to replace the old organ with a modern keyboard rather than attempt an expensive repair.

Each part was presented for dedication by a key person: the projection system by Bob Stewart, the sound system by trustee chair Ron Prevost, and the keyboard by our instrumentalist and choir director, Jo-Anne Jones. Pastor Kelvin Jones, Lay Leader Bob Loomis, and Council Chair Judy Holcomb then led the congregation in a prayer of dedication sanctifying all three items for the service of God in our church.


