Pastor's Postings Three Great Ways to Observe Lent

People often wonder, How should I observe Lent? Here are three excellent suggestions I follow myself, inspired by the 2015 Lenten Letter of Methodist Bishop Jane Allen Middleton:

"Give Up"—Sacrifice of some kind is an honored Lenten tradition. Jesus' sacrifice for us inspires us to discipline ourselves by meaningful sacrifice. Be creative. Traditional fasting from specific meals or foods may help us to discipline our appetites. But that is not the only kind of giving up that we need to learn. One young mother fasted from all media for a week! How about having a Lenten journey of de-accumulation, striving to reduce instead of add to our "stuff." Maybe we set a goal of recycling, giving away, discarding or repurposing a set number of items each week.

"Take Up"—Jesus encouraged us to take up our cross and follow Him. Often this means tackling some project or ministry on His behalf. We are His hands and feet of love, His influence working for justice and healing. Some Christians study the Bible, but do not use what they have learned. How about leading a study for new Christians? Or visiting someone who needs encouragement.


someone recovering from surgery or in a nursing home. Volunteer to help with crafts for a children's or senior citizen's event.

"Look Up"—to "Receive from Jesus." We live in the age of the Holy Spirit. God does not expect us to live the Christian life in our own strength. During Lent is an ideal time to draw on God's strength. Choose an additional way to draw close to God and allow His Spirit to fill you. Lent provides an ideal opportunity to take advantage of the Bible promise, "Come near to God and He will come near to you" (James 4:8 NIV 2011). Update your devotional practices in some way. Perhaps you could read a challenging spiritual classic. Some of my favorites are listed below.

The key to looking up during Lent is not just devotional activity; it is our attitude of receptivity--opening our mind to hear from God and our spirit to be strengthened anew by God's Spirit.

Food Pantry Donations

During 2016, our church gave more than **950 pounds** of goods to the food banks of East Granby, Granby, and Suffield. Well done! **Thank you to all who donated!**

We continue to collect nonperishable food, personal care items, paper products and cleaning supplies. When the box is full (or sometimes overfull), it is taken to one of these food pantries that we support. The collection box has been moved to the back of the kitchen for the winter months. When you are doing your weekly shopping, please pick up an item or two for those less fortunate.

St. Pauly's Collection

Over the past year, we have collected enough used clothing in the St. Pauly's shed to bring in \$680.52. At only four cents per pound, that means we collected more than 17,000 pounds of clothing! Because of people's generosity, we were



able to share this amount with the three area food pantries, giving more than \$225 to each.

In addition to clothing, St. Pauly's also accepts useable shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, linens, blankets, and drapes. (See page 3 for more info.)

New Bible Study

The Lenten season motivates us to study God's Word as an expression of our devotion. This year Copper Hill Church is sponsoring a Bible study series on the Letters of the Apostle John. Led by Pastor Kelvin Jones, the study meets on Monday evenings at 7 PM at the home of Judy Holcomb and at 1:30 PM on Tuesdays at the Higley Village Clubhouse. New participants are welcome.

Each small group session includes plenty of time for discussion and a short prayer time at the conclusion. The study series will continue through May.

John's most well know writings are his Gospel account and his apocalyptic and prophetic book, "Revelation." But he also wrote three letters, known as First, Second, and Third John, which are included in the New Testament. First John was written to Christians in the young churches and the other two very short letters were written to individual church leaders. We are learning that the three key words for his first letter are "light, life, and love."

"Jesus Speaks to Our Times"

Nearly everyone has been frustrated and upset by the recent tenor of the political dialogue in our country and troubled by some of the reactions to the elections. Pastor Jones believes that the Word of God and the Christian church have a special mission in exactly these kinds of times.

He has begun a message series for the Lenten/Easter season called "Jesus Speaks to Our Times." It draws from the accounts of Jesus' last days to find guidance for us today.



In the first message, on March 12, Pastor Kelvin reminded us that, in stark contrast to the self-focus and prejudice often evidenced today, God's love demands that we listen, show empathy, love impartially, and put love into action.

The series will encourage Christians to make their own mark with an agenda neither right nor left, but an agenda of love deliberately like Jesus.

About St. Pauly Textile Inc.

If you've dropped off used clothing in the St. Pauly shed in our church parking lot, you've probably wondered, Who is St. Pauly and what do they do with these clothes?

According to their website, St. Pauly Textile Inc. is a family-owned for-profit company based in Western New York, and a member of the Better Business Bureau. They collect useable clothing for people in need of it in the U.S. and in developing countries. They tell us there is a great need for clothing around the world. By contrast, 85% of clothing in the U.S. is thrown away, with only 15% reused.

St. Pauly checks their drop-off sheds regularly to make sure they're clean, and to pick up clothing. Their service helps local community organizations such as Copper Hill Church with their chosen mission projects, by purchasing the clothing, paying by weight. Our church is then able to cycle the money received back into the community by donating all of it to the area food banks. St. Pauly sells and distributes the clothing to organizations such as the U.N., relief organizations, foreign and U.S. governments, and private companies.

In addition to clothing, St. Pauly also accepts shoes, purses, linens, bedding, blankets, curtains, and stuffed animals, all in good condition, of course.

We are grateful to the many anonymous donors of clothing in our community. We want them to know they're giving twice: first to people around the world needing clothing, then to local families who are thankful to receive groceries they can use from the food banks.

We are reminded of Jesus' words, "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me" (Matt. 25:40).
