The Wonder of Christmas

Christmas is a supernatural season. What is there about these days surrounding Christmas that seem to have a different atmosphere? There is a generosity, a kindness, an excitement in the air. Holiday lights, adding to the festivity, are a sign that spiritual light has come into the world. Sometimes it might be too easy to allow all the busyness to distract us from the core meaning of the season, the true "Wonder of Christmas."

On the first Sunday of Advent at Copper Hill, we talked about "The Wonder of a Star." Christmas is a multifaceted message showing God's desire to reach out to us. On the second Sunday we explored "The Wonder of a Name." The name "Jesus" means "God saves." As we come to understand how God provides salvation through Jesus. we understand also why Christmas is so joyful. On the third Sunday, December 11, our bishop will visit to cap our church's 200th anniversary celebration. Since Christmas is a child-focused time, the children will sing, "I Saw Three Ships," reviewing the Christmas story. On the fourth Sunday, December 18, Pastor Kelvin will speak about "The Wonder of the Angels," since there are so many appearances of angels in the Christmas story.

The heart of the story of Jesus' birth, however, is the wonder that the only begotten Son of God should condescend to be born in an earthy manger, a cattle trough. That act of self-giving continues to transform our world. On Christmas Eve, the message will be "The Wonder of a Manger."

Christmas also means that God has chosen to be one of us in a major way. One of the names given to Jesus is "Emmanuel," meaning "God with us." Christmas is a living demonstration of God's promise that He will never leave us nor forsake us as we trust in the One born in the manger.

On Christmas morning (10:00 AM), we will talk about "The Wonder of the Promise."

Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton to visit Copper Hill

Excitement mounts as we look to host Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton on Sunday, December 11. Hearing about our 200th Anniversary celebration, he announced his intention to visit the church. No one remembers a United Methodist bishop visiting Copper Hill Church, so the visit is even more special.

Bishop Bickerton will bring the morning message during the 9:30 AM service. We count it an honor to host his visit, capping our 200th Anniversary events. A coffee hour will follow.

Bishop Bickerton was elected in 2004 and served the Western PA conference. He recently began his service to the 447 congregations of the New York Annual Conference. Bishop Bickerton has also chaired the UM Church's global health initiative responding to the killer diseases of HIV/AIDS, TB, and malaria. This effort, through the church's "Imagine No Malaria" campaign raised over \$70 million within the denomination. Copper Hill church participated each year in that campaign through their annual fundraising walk on the rail trail.

Our year included many special events, under the enthusiastic leadership of committee chair Carol Griffin and her able helpers. It was a delight to have friends from the community come in and celebrate with us.

We kicked off "200 Days of Celebration" in April with a history emphasis in our service,

music, and sermons. We also included a "History Moment," and a time for members to share what the church has meant to them personally. Our fellowship hall was decorated with old-time pictures and historical mementos.
